As we approach the end of a very busy and productive term, I want to share with you a few of our many achievements.

This has been a crucial term for our Year 11 students as we prepare for their final exams. Our staff are offering a wide range of additional learning opportunities including Saturday sessions and, in addition, we will be offering an extensive 'Easter School' to support our Year 11 students. The Year 11 cohort have now completed their second round of PPE's and the outcomes of these exams enable staff to provide targeted interventions leading into the GCSE exams.

As usual, our commitment to our enrichment offer continues at pace, both within and beyond the school day. This term groups of Sharples students have experienced a STEM Residential in the Peak District, and engaged with an Enterprise Day working with local businesses. As a whole school, we have celebrated National Careers Week and also STEM Week with a fantastic range of enrichment opportunities. Our commitment to CEIAG has been highlighted this month with 240 of our Year 10 students engaging with face-to-face work experience placements, the feedback from employers has been excellent and our students have, as usual, been brilliant ambassadors for Sharples.

Sharples is a busy and vibrant learning community and I would encourage you to follow us on Twitter and to read our weekly newsletter in order to keep up to date with the numerous opportunities which we provide to engage our learners.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind you of the importance of students arriving at school fully equipped for learning. ### **Princess Trust - Enterprise Challenge**



In January, 60 Year 10 students participated in the annual Princess Trust - Enterprise Challenge. This competition is run across Lancashire and Yorkshire and has over 900 participants. Part of the competition saw the Year 10 students split up into teams of 6, and compete against each other. The teams were set the challenge of developing an entrepreneurial solution linked to sustainability. Each team was then asked to present their business idea to the Prince Trust judges. Team KIG, consisting of Jenna, D'Arcy, Zakiyya, Kevin, Michael and Talal were shortlisted for the competition final in Leeds.


The final was held on Friday 24th March 2023 at the Leeds Marriott Hotel. Team KIG had to pitch their entrepreneurial idea (Uniform Upcycle) to a panel of business judges and an audience of over 100 members. Team KIG not only delivered a pitch which was inspirational and thought provoking, but one which entertained both audience and judges alike. Their idea, which involves reducing waste of outgrown uniforms, but also recycling these uniforms in order to provide affordable options for families on low or no income, which is extremely important in today's current economic climate.

Once all the pitches had been made, the judges deliberated for a short while, before returning and announcing the Top 3 in reverse order. This was perhaps the most nail biting moment of the day! Uniform Upcycle came through victorious, winning the competition, their idea standing out way ahead of their competitors. For their victory, Uniform Upcycle were awarded with a £500 prize to allow this or another enterprise to be created by the pupils within the school.

### **Sharples Baccalaureate**




It has been fantastic to see the momentum from last term continue with Year 7 attending the many clubs that have been on offer since January. Over 30 clubs have been available to Year 7 since the start of the year including, technicians academy, disney club, STEM club, keyboard club and maths club to name a few. Each time a student attended a club, they received a point that contributed towards their Sharples Baccalaureate award. To make it harder this term, the points needed to receive a Bronze, Silver or Gold award were increased. To achieve a Bronze award, students needed 15 Bacc points, 20 points were needed for Silver and 30 points were needed for Gold! Commitment and attendance at clubs has been excellent over the past couple of months and this was evident in Thursday's form time when 134 students achieved at least their Bronze award! Going one step further this term and as a result of their dedication to clubs, over 50 students with the highest number of Bacc points were treated to a rewards trip. On Monday morning, the students travelled to Hollywood Bowl (pictured above) and enjoyed a few hours of arcade fun and bowling! A huge well done to all of the Year 7 students who have been involved with clubs this term and we hope the momentum continues after Easter when a whole new selection of clubs will be on offer!

### **Physics Talk**

Year 11 students had a talk by a theoretical physicist and PhD student at the University of Nottingham, whose research focuses on the study of modified gravity theories and galaxies. The fascinating presentation included the answering of questions like: What is the speed of light? How do astronomers and cosmologists use light to learn about our Universe? How light can make you slim and stop you from ageing? Why is the most famous equation in physics wrong (sometimes)?



### **Space News**

At a recent Lunar and Planetary Science Conference, planetary scientist Carver Bierson presented some fascinating research on Jupiter and its moons. According to Bierson, Jupiter may have played a major role in creating the harsh conditions on its moon Io, due to its intense brightness in its early years. Additionally, Bierson suggests that this same brightness could have vaporised water on two other moons, Europa and Ganymede. If these findings are accurate, they could prove useful in the search for exomoons that are covered in ice, as it would allow researchers to eliminate unlikely orbits. Despite Jupiter appearing as a small speck in our night sky, past studies have revealed that it was far brighter during its early stages, estimated to be about 10 thousand times more luminous.

### **Scientist of the Month**

We are relaunching Scientist of the Month with Year 7 - 10 after Easter. The nomination process will be the same so make sure you are trying your hardest in all your science lessons, remember we are looking for most progress made not just academic achievement. Year 10 pupils have requested a certificate, digital and paper, for their achievement portfolio which you will receive as well as a gift bag and 5 excellence points, either given out in assembly or delivered to form rooms, and all the nominees will receive 2 reward points.
