### Easter In Paris



During the Easter break, 50 Year 8 pupils had the fantastic opportunity to visit Paris. We set off on Good Friday, so we experienced Easter in France. The visit started with a trip to Versailles, walking around the gardens in the sunshine. We also visited the palace, with the famous Hall of Mirrors known in history as the location where the Treaty of Versailles was signed, ending the First World War.



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On the second day, we went into Paris, taking a boat trip on the River Seine (pictured below right) to take photos of the main sites. We also had the perfect opportunity to take pictures of the Mona Lisa in the Louvre in the afternoon.



The pupils were thrilled to spend a day in DisneyLand, testing their limits on the scariest rides for the more adventurous members of the group. All the pupils enjoyed the atmosphere and meeting their favourite Disney characters.

Our final day in Paris was spent exploring the Cité des Sciences, Europe's largest science museum (pictured above left). Pupils took part in experiments and learned about robots and the human body. To end the trip, we walked along Les Champs Élysées, commonly regarded as the most beautiful avenue in the whole world, striking a pose in front of L'Arc de Triomphe (pictured on the previous page).

Pupils took every opportunity to practise their French speaking skills, and members of the public were impressed with how polite our pupils were as they engaged with all the activities on offer, learning about culture, history and language, along with life skills such as time management and communication. The pupils truly represented the Sharples family, and everyone involved, all staff and pupils, had a fantastic time in France. 
### Science career of the week

Check out this incredible picture (on the next page) taken by Owen G as part of his Astronomy coursework. The image shows the Horsehead Nebula, a dark or absorption nebula in the constellation of Orion. A dark nebula is a cloud of dust where star births occur. The nebula is named due to the shape resembling a horse's head, seen in the centre of the image. The image also includes a reflection nebula to the left. Great work Owen!

Looking up at the night sky never fails to inspire awe and wonder, and this weekend is a particularly exciting time for stargazers. Venus, our closest planetary neighbour, will be visible to the naked eye and will be in close proximity to the crescent moon. The best time to catch this beautiful sight is during the late afternoon on Sunday. Recent discoveries have also shed new light on the mysteries of Venus. It was once believed that the planet had only a handful of active volcanoes, but recent studies have revealed that Venus actually has a staggering 85,000 active volcanoes, 50 times more than previously thought. This discovery has not only deepened our understanding of Venus, but also of how planets evolve and change over time. So if you're looking for a weekend activity that's out of this world, be sure to take a look at Venus and marvel at the wonders of our universe.


