MyLOL is a free social networking and dating site aimed at teens. Profiles can publicly display users' images and information, including sexual orientation and personal interests. The service bills itself as "the number one teen dating

## WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

 website in the world", claiming to have more than a million users globally. Despite its popularity, the MylOL app is no longer available from Google Play or the App Store, although the site is still active. In some countries, police forces and schools have previously warned parents about "sinister predators" and "inappropriate activities" on the site.
## FLMSY AGE GATES

Although MyLOL states it is exclusively aimed at users aged between 13 and 19, there is no credible age verification system to prevent a younger child - or an older adult - from signing up to the platform. Coupled with the fact that it's impossible to establish a user's true identity on MyLOL, this raises a serious concern that the site could be used for grooming.

## AGE-NAPPROPRIATE CONIENT

MyLOL maintains that it monitors all uploaded images for nudity or sexual content. It also claims to be able to detect suspicious keywords. However, there have been numerous reports of explicit content being found on the platform, with users often posting provocative. semi-nude pictures of themselves and engaging in flirty or sexually explicit conversation.

## POTENTIAL

CYBER-BULLYNG
MyLOL lets users 'vote' on other people based solely on their appearance, much in the same vein as the now-defunct site Hot or Not. This feature could easily lead to distress and bullying, especially if a young person's profile pics receive an unfavourable response. Variou reviews of MyLOL have noted that bullying frequently becomes an issue in the platform's chat groups and private messages.


## IN-APP SPENDING

MyLOL is free to join and use, but it also offers paid-for memberships. Users who have paid money get their profile promoted at the top of their profile promoted at the top of
the site and in search results. They the site and in search results. They
can also earn additional credits for can also earn additional credits for
increased engagement with the increased engagement with the
platform - such as sharing, replying to messages and voting. At the time of writing, the monthly membership fee was $\$ 9.95$ (just under $£ 8$ ).

## DATA COLLECTION

According to its privacy policy, MyLOL collects user data including email addresses, contact details and interests. While the company says it is committed to protecting users' privacy, the small print states that information may be shared externally. MyLOL claims to follow externalily. MyLOL ciaims to foliow
procedures to keep data secure, but procedures to keep data secu does not specify what these
procedures are, or whether such information is encrypted.

## CONTACT FROM

 STRANGERSMyLOL makes it easy to connect with strangers. In fact, the site's rewards feature encourages users to send private messages to people they don't know. There have been several media stories of adults posing as teens on MyLOL to connect with minors, which could lead to extremely dangerous situations, such as a young person meeting up under a false identity.

## EXPLAIN PRNACY RISKS

Before your child begins using a service such as MyLOL, it's important that they understand the potential pitfalls of giving out their personal data on this type of platform. Explain to them, for example, that they shouldn't divulge any personally identifying information to people who they don't know, as scammers can be quite convincing when attempting to steal someone's identity.

## SET UP LOCATION ALERTS

If you're worried that your child may be planning to meet up with someone they've met on MyLOL, you could consider utilising GPS or WiFi location tracking technology to follow their whereabouts in real time. You can even set up a virtual boundary or 'fence' and opt to receive an alert to your phone if your child enters or exits a specified area.

# The Sophie Scholl Awards 

"Someone has to make a start." How about you?


Holocaust Memorial Day is commemorated each year on 27th January, the date of the liberation of the Nazi concentration camp Auschwitz-Birkenau in 1945. Holocaust Memorial Day remembers the millions of victims of the Nazi Holocaust, including six million Jews, and of other, more recent genocides.


The Sophie Scholl Awards were introduced at Runshaw as part of our events to commemorate Holocaust Memorial Day. The courage of Sophie Scholl, of a similar age to Runshaw students, was an inspiration to us all. We now extend an invitation to pupils in partner high schools to help us celebrate the short life of this brave young woman by participating in awards reserved for them.

Sophie was 18 when the war started in 1939. She and her family, inspired by their strong religious beliefs, actively resisted the Nazis - an incredibly courageous thing for Germans to do. In 1942, Sophie, along with her brother Hans and a few other students, founded the White Rose, a non-violent resistance movement which painted anti-fascist slogans on walls, defaced Nazi emblems and distributed anti-war leaflets. In early 1943, Sophie and the other leaders of the group were caught, condemned as traitors and executed by beheading. Sophie was just 21.

During her trial, despite the attempts of the judge and prosecutors to browbeat and ridicule her, Sophie remained steadfast as one individual against the massive power of the Nazi state. "Someone has to make a start", she said. Convinced that good in the end would prevail, her last words as she was led into the execution yard were, "The sun still shines!"

For many inspired by Sophie's example, a white rose has come to represent peace, justice and a love of humanity.

Students in partner high schools are asked to make an entry based on ONE of the following themes:
(a) The inspiration of Sophie Scholl
(b) The White Rose
(c) Someone has to make a start

## Entries can be

- a written piece (maximum 250 words but could be much shorter)
- a poem
- a piece of art work or music - of any kind
- an idea to do something at school based on Sophie's example
- anything at all based on one of the above themes.

Entries can be individual or group work.
Entries should be forwarded to Ciles Inman, Inman.G@runshaw-ac.uk. The deadline for entries is 4.30pm on Wednesday 21st February 2024.

Awards of vouchers and certificates will be awarded for the best entries.
