Start of Autumn 2 Half Term Letter to Parents

Dear Parent/Carer,

As we come to the end of the second week of Autumn Term 2 I would like to update you on the latest news from school and what is coming up in the next few weeks.

Last weekend we opened our doors to the local community of Astley Bridge as Sharples played host to the Remembrance Day Service. The Royal British Legion Club of Astley Bridge organised the event, which saw a marching band make their way from Belmont Road to Sharples, followed by the local scout and guide groups, members of the local community, and the parade was greeted at the school gates by a guard of honour of our Gold Tie School Leaders. The service was moving and respectful, with beautiful performances by the Sharples Choir. We are honoured that our school was able to provide this occasion for our community and we look forward to continuing the tradition for years to come.

This week, Year 11 students have sat their first GCSE Mock Examinations in English and maths. It has been an intensive week, with revision sessions every evening and an exam every day. The students have shown great commitment and resilience and we are very proud of all of them. The results will be analysed and used to provide next steps to improve in their journey to final GCSE exams in May 2026.

On Friday 28th November we will be holding our annual Diversity Day. This is always a favourite day in the Sharples calendar for students and staff, and we look forward to seeing students dress in outfits which represent their heritage, countries of ancestry or just something that is unique to them. As this is an annual day to celebrate the diversity and individuality of our Sharples students, once again we ask that no flags are brought into school on this day. We will be holding our popular Diversity Day stalls at lunchtime, with food, drink, crafts and gifts on sale from 50p. Parents/Carers can buy books of vouchers via MCAS for £5 each. The vouchers will be delivered to students via forms on the day, and these can be spent in multiples of 50p at the stalls. Cash will also be accepted on the day. All proceeds will be donated to the charity OXFAM.

Year 9 students are beginning the preparations for their formal pre-option exams in January which will provide invaluable assessment information to students, teachers and parents prior to our Options process where students will select their GCSE courses of study for September 2026. Revision technique sessions are being delivered to all Year 9 Forms this half term and parents will receive revision lists and a full exam schedule in due course.

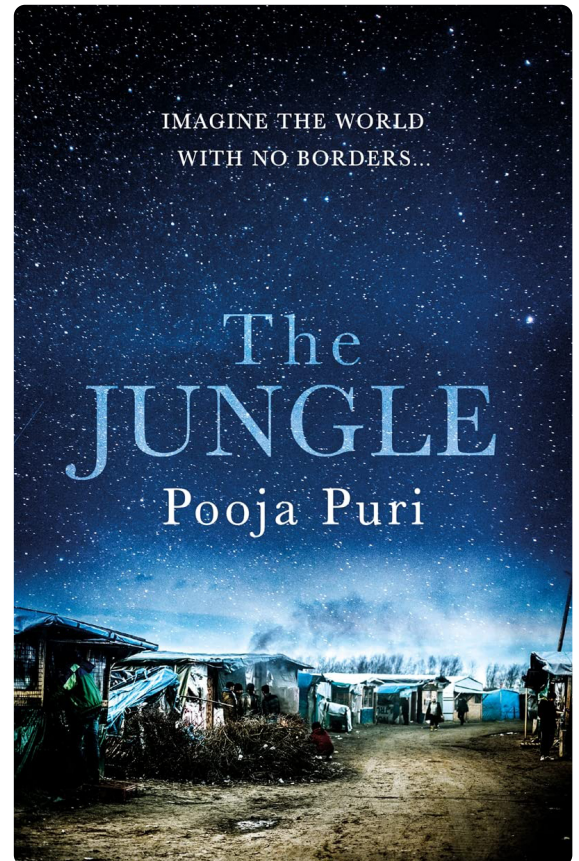

Live Author Talk: Pooja Puri

Last Friday, our Year 9 pupils had the exciting opportunity to hear from Pooja Puri, author of the novel *The Jungle*. Since the start of the year, students have been exploring the book in their English lessons, discussing the important issues it raises and the key messages it conveys about immigration.

During her talk, Pooja Puri gave a fascinating insight into her thoughts on the Calais refugee camp and the struggles faced by asylum seekers. She also explained why she developed her characters and setting in the ways she did. Hearing her discuss her writing inspirations, the beginnings of her interests, and the small, deliberate details she included in the novel opened up a whole new perspective for the students.

The talk gave them a deeper appreciation for the story and its characters, and they are now even more excited to continue reading!





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"I can do Physics!" Club – Inspiring the Next Generation of Physicists



This week saw the launch of Sharples School's brand-new "I can do Physics!" club at The Valley Primary School.

The project aims to inspire younger pupils, particularly girls, to develop confidence and curiosity in physics from an early age.

The club is led by a team of five Year 10 Sharples pupils, who act as near-peer role models, delivering fun, hands-on physics activities to a group of Year 1 pupils.

During the first session, pupils explored the idea of floating and sinking by building their very own rainbow density towers. The room was full of excitement, laughter, and bright colours as the children carefully layered liquids to create their beautiful rainbows — all while discovering how density makes objects float or sink!

The project will continue throughout this half term, with pupils exploring a different strand of physics each week.

Afterwards, the club will move to another local primary school, giving even more pupils the chance to take part.

Miss Melmoth, Physics Teacher and KS3 Science Coordinator, who leads the project, said:

"It's wonderful to see our older pupils inspiring the next generation. The enthusiasm from both the Sharples students and the Year 1 children has been fantastic — it's exactly what learning about physics should be about: curiosity, creativity, and confidence."

Our amazing Art Ambassadors are already planning other ways they can support primary links.

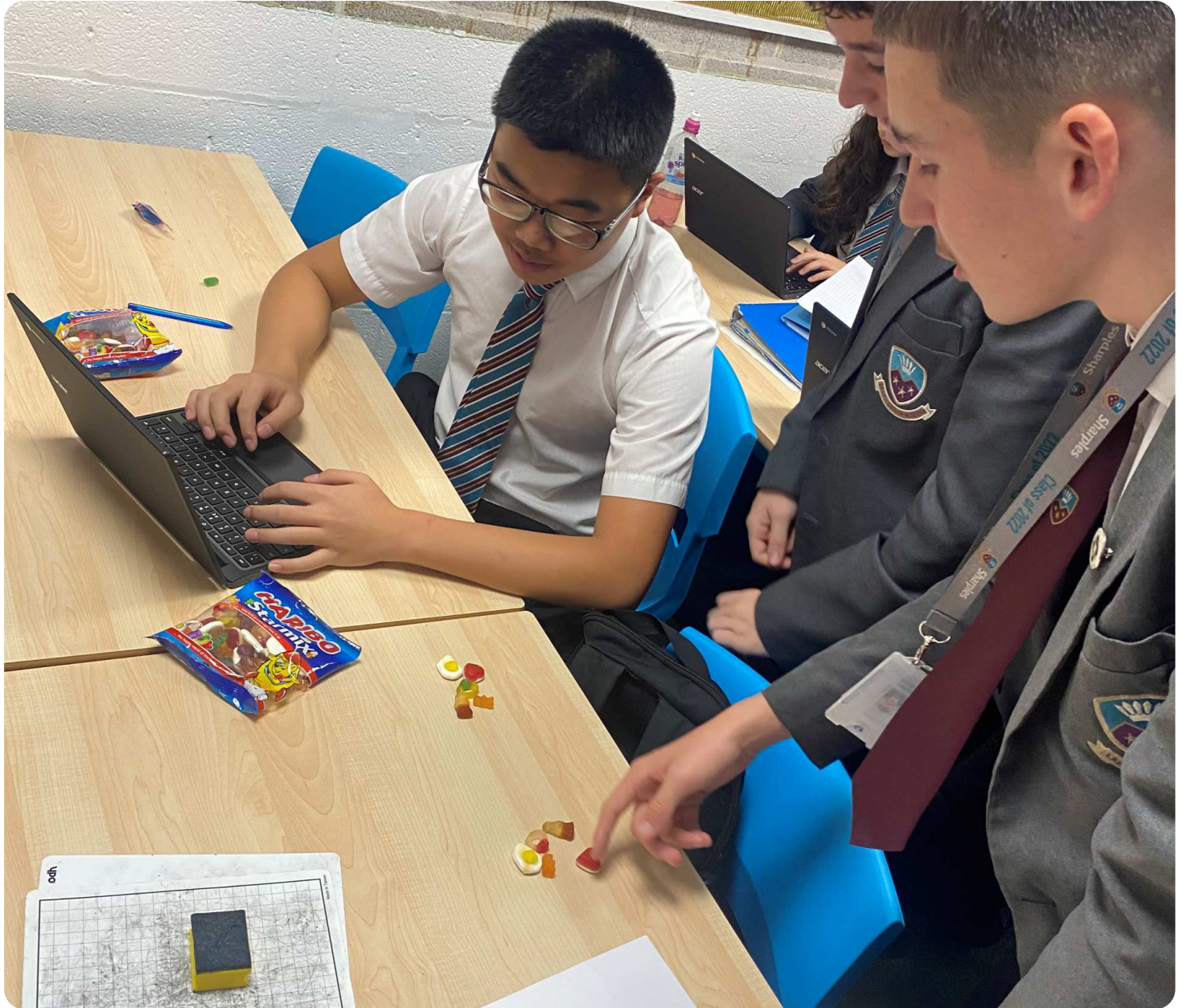


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Year 10 GCSE Statistics

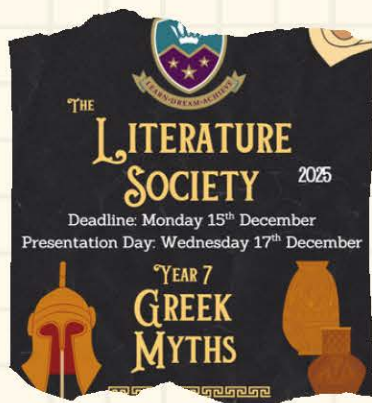

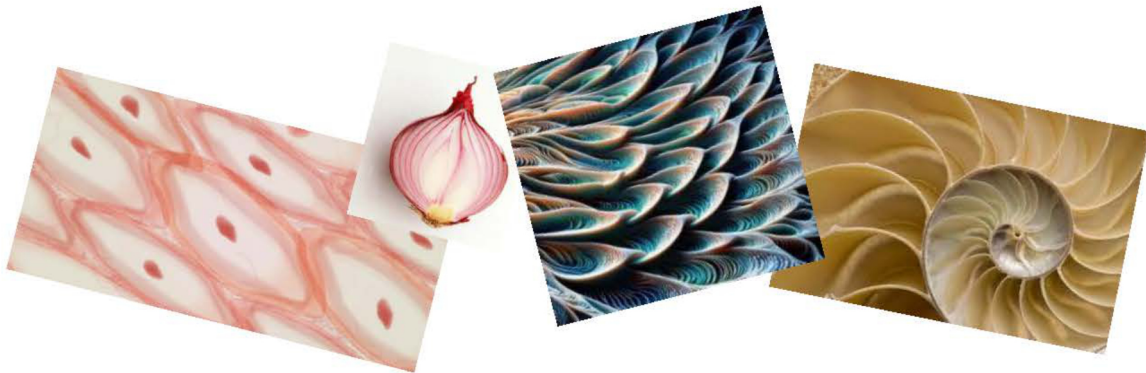

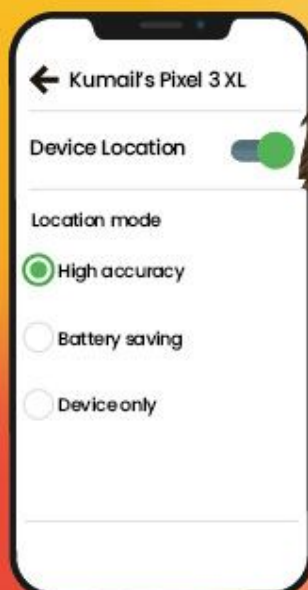

How to Set up PARENTAL CONTROLS for PRIVACY Android Phone

The settings on an Android device allow you to set certain rules to help safeguard your child's privacy when they are using it. For example, you can turn off location services to keep their whereabouts private; prevent third-party apps and sites from viewing their information; and stop apps from accessing other functions of the phone (like the camera or microphone, for example). We've produced step-by-step guides on how to tighten up an Android phone's privacy settings.



How to manage location services

- 1 Open the Google Family Link app
- 2 Select your child's account
- 3 On the 'Settings' card, tap 'Manage'
- 4 Tap 'Location'
- 5 On the card with the correct device's name, tap 'Settings'
- 6 Tap 'Location Settings'
- 7 Turn 'Device location' to off
- 8 To reactivate location services in future, repeat these steps and turn 'Device location' back on

How to control access for third-party apps and sites

- 1 Sign in to your Google Families account
- 2 Under 'Members', select your child's name
- 3 Select 'Account info' and then 'More'
- 4 Select 'Third-party apps with account access'
- 5 Turn 'Allow third-party apps to access XX account' to off by toggling the switch

How to manage app permissions

- 1 Open the Google Family Link app
 - 2 Select your child's account
 - 3 On the 'Device' card, tap 'Settings'
 - 4 Tap 'App permissions' then choose a permission
 - 5 Below your child's device, switch the permission off
- Alternatively, you can manage permissions for individual apps. Repeat steps 1 and 2, then...
- 3 On the 'Apps installed' card, tap 'More'
 - 4 On the 'Allowed' list, tap the app you want to change the permissions for
 - 5 Tap 'App permissions'
 - 6 Switch the permission off

How to Set up PARENTAL CONTROLS for PRIVACY iPhone

The privacy settings on your child's Apple device give you control over the information stored on it. This allows you to select which apps can access features and information on your child's device: for example, you might wish to block a social networking app from connecting to the camera reel, or specify which apps can use the device's location data.

How to make changes to privacy settings

You can block certain apps from obtaining information from your child's device. You can also prevent your child (or anyone other than you) from altering these settings.

1 Open 'Settings'

2 Tap 'Screen Time'

3 Tap 'Content & Privacy Restrictions'

4 Scroll to 'Privacy'

5 Choose the settings you wish to restrict

6 After you've made any changes, select 'Use Screen Time Passcode' to lock your changes with a PIN



How to prevent changes to other settings/features

You can also stop changes being made to the iPhone's other settings or features by anyone but you. For example, you can prevent your child from altering their passcode, accounts or mobile data settings.

1 Open 'Settings'

2 Tap 'Screen Time'

3 Tap 'Content & Privacy Restrictions'

4 Scroll to 'Allow Changes'

5 Select 'Allow' or 'Don't Allow' on the settings for which you wish to enable or disable changes

You're asked to pay by bank transfer instead of using the online platform's secure payment options.

STOP - THIS COULD BE FRAUD

A sense of urgency is placed on ordering the product or service so that you don't miss the price / deal.

STOP - THIS COULD BE FRAUD

You receive a fake email receipt / invoice that appears to be from the website you've purchased from or the payment service used to make your purchase. The email address domain doesn't match that of the genuine senders.

STOP - THIS COULD BE FRAUD

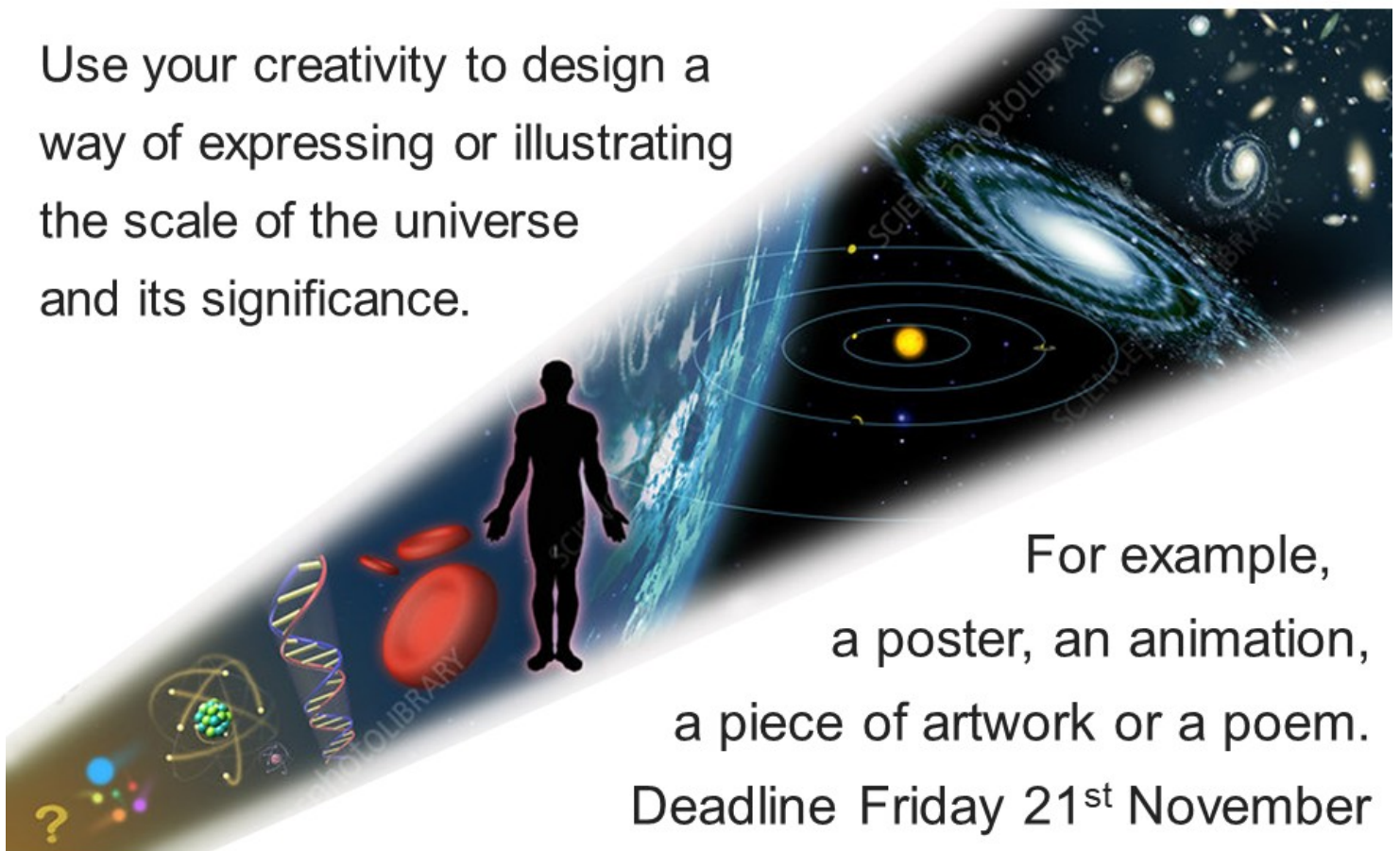
