As we approach the February half term, I would like to provide an update on school activities and successes over the past few weeks.

This week our Year 10 students have ventured out into the world of work across a wide variety of work experience placements. We have seen students working in dental surgeries, primary schools, car showrooms, cafes, pharmacies and more. The feedback from employers has been so positive, and it is fantastic to see our young people preparing themselves for their future careers and representing themselves so well.

Year 11 have engaged well with their first full PPE mock examinations, showing stamina and resilience through what has been a gruelling three weeks. We look forward to sharing their results and more importantly next steps in learning, with parents after the half term holiday.

We were delighted to see our very first entrants in the Bolton heats of The Battle of The Bands, held at The Roundhouse music venue last week. "Five Blind Chickens", comprising Year 8 musicians and the Year 9/10 group "Stave and Close". Both bands put on a great performance and it was a great experience for them to perform in a professional venue. We now have over 100 students taking part in weekly musical instrument lessons.

This week we have celebrated "Chinese New Year", with the tradition of the Sharples Dragon once again making its way around the school to distribute treats.

Next week, many of our families will begin their observance of Ramadan and we are supporting our students to continue with their normal studies at school through provision of quiet spaces at lunchtime and PE will deliver orienteering to students. We are also planning our annual Sharples Year 9 Iftar which will be held on Friday 6th March and the Easter Sharples Family Meals for Y8 which will take place at the end of term.

I would like thank all parents who joined us for our Parent Forum and PTA Meetings this term. Update for Parents/Carers Regarding Mobile Phones

We are writing to remind you of Sharples School's expectations regarding mobile phone use, in line with our Mobile Phone Policy and the most recent Department for Education (DfE) guidance on mobile phones in schools which was released last week. The updated guidance is clear that schools are expected to operate as **mobile phone-free environments throughout the entire school day**, including lessons, movement between lessons, breaktimes and lunchtimes as well as on site before and after school. The DFE guidance provides examples of inappropriate use of phones, for example as a calculator or for research purposes.

At Sharples School, we are fully committed to maintaining a safe, calm and focused learning environment for all pupils and you will be aware that our policy is already that the site is phone free. However, we are updating our mobile phone policy, in light of the new guidance.

Whilst we recognise that many students carry a phone for personal safety when travelling to and from school, we now require that **phones must be switched off before entering the school site and remain switched off and kept out of sight at all times while on school grounds**. This expectation applies before school, during the school day (including break and lunchtimes), and after school until pupils have left the site.

Our approach is one of **clear expectations and zero tolerance to phone use in school**.

If a pupil is found accessing a mobile phone during the school day:

- The phone will be **confiscated until the end of the following school day**, and parents/carers will be informed.
- Repeated breaches will lead to **longer confiscation periods and further sanctions** in line with the Behaviour Policy (see the school website for further details).
- Refusal to hand over a phone when requested will result in **immediate placement in the IEU for that day and the following day until 4.30pm and parental contact**.

Safeguarding remains our highest priority. Any misuse of a phone to take photographs, record, or communicate in a harmful or inappropriate way will result in more serious consequences, and external agencies may be involved where necessary.

If students require assistance during the school day, then they should alert a member of staff. *...continued on the next page*



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Contact home will always be made in the event of an emergency.

If you need to contact your child urgently during the school day, you should:

- **Telephone the school office**, and we will endeavour to ensure that the message is passed on as quickly as possible, or
- **Email a member of staff** or office@sharplesschool.co.uk who will respond as quickly as possible.

We are grateful for your continued support in reinforcing these expectations with your child. By working together, we can ensure that Sharples School remains a safe, respectful and disruption-free environment where all pupils can focus fully on their learning and wellbeing.

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Safer Internet Day: Starting the Conversation About AI and Online Responsibility

Tuesday February 10th, saw Sharples School join millions of people worldwide in recognising Safer Internet Day, an annual event held in over 170 countries. The aim of the day is to bring people together to make the internet a safer and better place for everyone, especially children and young people.

During the Safer Internet Day assembly, students explored one of the most talked-about technologies of our time: Artificial Intelligence (AI). Students learned that although AI systems may seem as though they can “think for themselves,” they are actually trained using large amounts of data. This allows them to recognise patterns, make decisions, and generate content.

Many students already interact with AI daily through virtual assistants, chatbots, and the algorithms behind social media and streaming services. The assembly also highlighted some inspiring ways AI is being used for good, such as protecting rainforests, supporting surgeons during complex operations, helping deaf children learn to read, assisting blind and low-vision people, promoting sustainable fishing, and even helping protect honeybee populations.

However, the assembly also made it clear that AI is not without its challenges, and that it's important to think critically about its wider impact — both now and in the future.

Some young people are concerned that AI could replace jobs, making it harder to find employment in the future. Schools and colleges are also thinking carefully about how AI might be used in education, particularly when it comes to students relying on it to complete work rather than developing their own skills. There are also serious concerns around deepfakes, where AI is used to create realistic images or videos of events that never actually happened, sometimes causing real harm.

Importantly, students were reminded that there is no single “right” way to use AI. Some people may want to build a career around developing or working with AI. Others may choose to use it occasionally for specific tasks, and some may decide not to use it at all. All of these choices are normal and valid.

What matters most is using technology safely and responsibly. This means:

- Thinking about how your use of AI might affect others, even if something is meant as a joke
- Understanding consent and respecting other people's boundaries

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- Thinking critically about information AI provides, as it may not always be accurate
- Reflecting on the ethics of AI and its impact on society
- Being aware of how AI use affects your own wellbeing
- Knowing when and where to seek help, and speaking to a trusted adult if needed

Start a conversation

AI is an evolving technology that is likely to shape all of our lives. This Safer Internet Day, we want to start a conversation. We are encouraging students to talk to their friends, talk to their family, and talk to staff at school. How do you feel about AI? Do you see it as a force for good, or do you have concerns? What support would help you use it safely and responsibly? And what do you think adults need to understand about how AI is affecting your lives?

Safer Internet Day AI Emoji Language Challenge

Students are invited to design their own emojis that communicate messages about using AI safely and responsibly. Emojis could represent ideas such as:

- Safe AI use – using smart technology carefully to protect yourself
- Honest AI use – being open and responsible when using AI tools
- Risky AI use – highlighting potential dangers or poor choices
- Privacy protection – keeping personal information safe

This challenge encourages students to think creatively about how AI is used and how key online safety messages can be shared in a fun and visual way.

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Who Am I Project Exhibition



The Schools Linking Network in Bolton is one of 27 networks across the UK which links classes together to explore issues around identity, diversity, community and inclusion.

Schools Linking is backed by DfE, MCHLG and the Pears Foundation. The programme meets Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural (SMSC) requirements, allowing schools to embed SMSC development and British Values into the curriculum.

The 'Who am I?' project launched in November 2022 and has continued to flourish and expand, due to its success and continued funding. The schools, located across different areas of Bolton with contrasting demographics, met to work together on ...



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the topic of identity using Holocaust Art as a central theme.

Each project brings together four schools. This project's schools were, Bolton St Catherine's Academy, Mount St. Joseph High, Sharples High School and St. Joseph's RC High. We met all together in November 2025. Then in December 2025 and January 2026 and, each pair of schools met twice – once at each school, to continue their work. During the school-based sessions, Nicola Mahon, EAL teacher and Bolton Schools Linking facilitator used high quality resources from The Linking Network to explore the question 'Who am I?'. Caroline Slifkin, a qualified and experienced Holocaust Arts Teacher delivered Holocaust Arts sessions where pupils looked at how Holocaust victims and survivors define themselves and their experiences through art. Pupils then responded by creating self-portraits, in whatever medium and style they wished.


They have included many elements of their identity within their work - family, home, heritage, community, interests, religion/beliefs amongst others, and many were inspired by the Holocaust artists they had studied earlier in the project.

Finally on January 28th, 2026, the four schools came back together to celebrate what they had achieved through this project and share their artwork with each other. They also had the opportunity to meet and listen to the testimony of a third generation, Hannah Goldstone, whose grandfather came to England on the Kindertransport. Thank you to all the wonderful staff and students involved in this project.

We are delighted to be able to share the students' work with the wider public through this exhibition at Asda Bolton and hope you enjoy, and feel inspired by, their artwork. The Exhibition will be on until Easter and is pictured above.

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
February STEM Challenge



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Space Science Visit from St Thomas, Halliwell



Students from St Thomas' Primary School in Halliwell enjoyed an exciting afternoon of space science when they visited Sharples School. The young scientists took part in a range of hands-on activities designed to spark their curiosity about the universe. 



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Royal Academy of Arts Young Artists Summer Call For Entries Show


